Membership Committee Report for 2017

The Membership committee consists of three groups:

- -Member Acquisition: Anita Mahoney, Edie Herro, Natalie Azadimani;
- -Member Integration and Retention: Shelley Bliss, Mark Sneddon, Stacy Paluch;
- -Marketing: Chris and Vivian James, Jane Pimentel.

It was a good year: we had a booth at Strictly Sail, Sailstice, Marina Village Boat Fest and at the Junior Sailing Open House. We also offered various incentive programs such as the No Initiation Fee for Jr Sailing parents, and for boat or service purchasers via local brokers and marine services. In December, our friends at BCBC were offered a window to join EYC waiving the Initiation Fee.

All this resulted in a gain of new members of 63 total, offset by 48 resignations for a net gain in membership of 15. The largest source of new members was friends and referrals (35%), with Jr Sailing second at 23% of the total; the February special (no initiation fee during that month) yielded 8 new members (13%). Strictly Sail did not deliver any new members, so we have deleted that from the list of activities for this year.

In the coming year we plan to attend Jr.Sailing Open House, Sailstice, Boat Fest and a new activity Meals on Wheels. We will also participate in the Chamber of Commerce mixer and have an Open House at the Club in April.

The Membership Integration and Retention group also has a number of activities planned for this year, among others a New Member cocktail party, Ice Cream Social, a mid-summer reception, and a Boats-in-the-Basin event at the Club.

Current incentives for 2018 that are approved by the Board are: 1) waiver of initiation fees (the full initiation fee is \$1,000) for parents of Junior Sailing students; 2) 50% reduction in the initiation fee for applicants at the boat shows/fairs/Open House events; 3) the Broker program which waives initiation fees for purchasers of a boat; and 4) a winter special, where initiation fee is waived if joining EYC in February.

Membership dues are the largest source of revenues for the Club: the more members we have, the more activities, personnel and fixed asset investments we can afford. So bring your neighbors, friends, family, the guy on the boat next to you, to the Club and show them what a great facility we have and what good times can be had on the water and at the Club! Also, we need masses of volunteers to staff the booth and other events: sign up with us and enjoy helping the Club grow!!

The new year is under weigh and we couldn't be more excited for what's in store! Before we take a look at what's on the horizon for 2018, we should review what's taken place already this year!

Off the water, we hosted our highly anticipated annual Jr. Sailing Crab Feed and were thrilled to have a sell-out crowd of folks who enjoyed an evening of delicious crab while supporting our program. A huge thanks goes out to all who volunteered and attended the most important fundraiser of the year! We were also able to choose the winner of our Instant Wine Cellar Raffle and must thank to all of those who purchased tickets and/or donated wine. Hopefully we'll all get another chance at it next year!

On the water, we wasted no time in providing some killer opportunities for local sailors and were thrilled to host the **Bay Area Youth Sailing (BAYS) Winter Team Race Clinic on January 2 & 3.** This event was open to and free for all sailors who are members of local clubs and was led by John Vandemoer (Stanford Sailing Head Coach) and Noah Barrengos (Hobart/William Smith Sailing Team). About thirty sailors attended and were met with windless conditions which allowed for only 30 minutes of productive sailing on the second day. Sailors were still thrilled to attend and have the opportunity to have long lecture, video, discussion, and land drill sessions with John and Noah.

Just a few days later several EYC-based high school sailing teams traveled with coaches and parents to Long Beach to compete in the 2018 PCISA #3 "Rose Bowl" regatta. Alameda, Miramonte, Campolindo, Head Royce, and College Park teams all competed in either Gold, Silver, or Bronze fleets against the best high school teams in the state, plus a few from other parts of the country! Our sailors were also lucky enough to compete alongside a number of college sailing teams who were also attending this event, and to attend the annual college sailing forum that is put on by the U.S. Sailing Center at Long Beach after the first day of racing. Conditions were tricky but far superior to last year (where no quality races were completed due to lack of wind), and our sailors completed eight races per division, coming home hungry and ready for the rest of the high school season.

Auto payment options include ACH transfer from bank to bank with no fee or if you want to rack up reward points on a credit card you can select the credit card payment option (There is a 3% processing fee applied to your account for the credit card payment option). How do I sign up to use the online bill payment system?

Can I still pay my balance by check even if I sign up for online bill payment?

Yes. You can see your last statement online, download the statement for your records, and mail a check to the Encinal Yacht Club 1251 Pacific Marina Alameda, CA 94501.

Paying Bills Online

How can I pay my Encinal account online?

You have two choices:

- Go online and pay your bill manually each month
- Sign up for auto-pay

Manual Pay

How do I manually pay my balance online?

On the "Pay Balance" page, choose "E-check" under payments methods. You must log in each month to manually pay your balance.

Auto-pay

What is auto-pay?

During the 5th-7th of every month, Encinal will deduct the balance due shown on your most recent statement from your bank account, or charge the balance due to your credit card. You will not have to log-in to pay your balance online each month if you sign up for auto-pay.

How do I activate auto-pay?

Click on the "Member Statements" link on the left side of the "Members' Area" main page. In the box on the upper left, click on "Edit my credit card" or "Edit my bank account", depending on which method you want to use for auto-pay. Races 7& 8 of the Encinal Yacht Club's Jack Frost Series were sailed under near perfect winter conditions: north wind blowing 5-8 knots, for spice, a bit of current running from north to south through the Eastbay course near the Berkeley pier and sunny, balmy temperatures. Racing was fast and fun.

Azure, skippered by Rodney Pimentel, barely held on to his Class 1 series first place. A late start in the first race put them at the end of the fleet for that race. With only one point between the three lead boats it should be interesting racing next month to determine the series winner.

The Santana 22 fleet was as tight as ever with finishes within seconds and minutes of each other. **Jan Grygier and Lindsey Jennings** were pleased to cinch to first place wins to keep their series lead over **Igor Polevoy & crew on High and Dry**. **Zingaro's** two second place wins pulled them up the ladder into 3rd overall just ahead of **Albacore and Meliki**.

After several canceled "no wind" races in December and January there will not be enough race days to have any throw outs for the series this year. March standings will be the determining races for several of the classes. The race committee and the racers are hopeful that March will bring good wind for the final day of the Jack Frost winter racing to finish season with a smile for everyone.



State Issues - RBOC

<u>Division of Boating and Waterways Now Accepting California Boater Card Applications</u>

Following please find the announcement that the Division of Boating and Waterways is accepting applications for the California Boater Card.

Starting in January 2018, recreational vessel operators of motorized vessels will be required to pass a boating exam after which they will be issued a certification card.


The process will first address individuals 20 and younger and then proceed to include boaters of all ages. RBOC supported the legislation that was enacted to establish this program, SB 941 Monning and DeSaulnier, Chapter 433, Statutes of 2014.

The organization worked to have the program established at DBW, rather than DMV, to ensure that the certificate fees would be reasonable, and to provide for a lifetime certificate rather than a licensure program.

Sacramento, Calif. – California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) is now accepting applications for the California Boater Card. The card verifies that its holder has successfully taken and passed an approved boater safety education course. Once issued, the California Boater Card remains valid for an operator's lifetime.

On Sept. 18, 2014, Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. signed into law Senate Bill 941, which prohibits the operation of motorized vessels in California without a valid boater card developed and issued by DBW. The new mandatory boating safety education law will go into effect Jan. 1, 2018. The law will be phased in by age. The first group required to take the exam are boaters 20 years of age and younger. Each year after January 2018, a new age group will be added to those who are required to possess a valid card. By 2025, all persons who operate a motorized vessel on California waters will be required to have one. The cost of the lifetime card is \$10, and all the money goes toward developing and operating the program. By law, DBW cannot profit from the program.

"California and U.S. Coast Guard accident data show that states with some form of boating safety education have fewer accidents and fatalities than states without any boater education requirements," said DBW Acting Deputy Director Ramona Fernandez. "This new law will help make boating safer for all families on California's waterways."

California is one of the last states to implement some sort of mandatory boating education requirement. Repeatedly, recreational boating accident data shows that many operators involved in accidents have not taken a boating safety course. For example, last year's statistics showed that more than 800 California recreational vessels were involved in reported accidents, resulting in 50 deaths. Only one of the boat operators involved in the fatal accidents had taken an approved boating safety course.

Applying for the California Boater Card is easy. Boaters have an option to apply before or after taking an approved boating safety course. You can find the list of options at www.CaliforniaBoaterCard.com. A toll-free telephone support line is also available at (844) 421-8333.

There is good news for boaters who have already taken an approved course between Jan. 1, 2015 and Dec. 31, 2017 - Persons who have passed an approved examination during this timeframe will have until Dec. 31, 2018 to apply for their California Boater Card to receive the "grandfathering" exemption regardless of their age. Older courses will not be accepted since they may not include recent state or national changes to navigation law.

Boating safety course providers must be approved not only by the state of California, but by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators. Courses may be classroom, home study or online.

It is important to note there are exemptions to the new law. For example, those operating a rental vessel or possess a current commercial fishing license do not need to obtain a California Boater Card. For more information on the new mandatory boating safety education law, including a current list of approved California boating courses and exemptions to the law, please visit www.CaliforniaBoaterCard.com.
