


To all members and racers:

In compliance with County, State, and US Coastguard mandates, we are suspending all racing activities through the end of April 2020. This includes the cancellation of the Estuary Cup on April 5 and the first two races of the Friday Night Twilight Series on April 10 and April 24. At this time it is not possible with any degree of certainty to predict what our spring and summer race schedule will look like, now or even in a few weeks. We intend to provide first updates by the end of March 2020 with any news about our summer schedule.

There are three major regattas scheduled for spring and early summer. The Encinal Flag, our race committees, and numerous club volunteers are currently involved with planning and preparation for these right now. These events are the California Offshore Race Week, the Lipton Cup and the Encinal Regatta. In addition, the Mercury NorCals and Twilight Series are on the Encinal race program. Online meetings are scheduled over the next week for each of these regattas to assist with the decision process by providing detailed information and reasoning regarding the viability of holding these events.

To be considered applicants must be:

- Students whose parents, grandparents, guardians or mentors are members of a yacht club belonging to PICYA
- Applicants must be graduating high school seniors of the current year, or college students continuing to pursue their educational goals.
- Scholarships are not renewable.
 However, previous recipients are eligible to reapply, provided they still meet all other qualifications.
- An essay is required along with a completed application.

Thick fog in the Alameda/Oakland Estuary dampened the mood on the way to the Encinal Yacht Club Jack frost races on Saturday February 1 2020. But a filling north wind buoyed spirits and cleared the course of the fog before the 11:30 start time to create a lovely midwinter race day.

For the morning race, #7, with a 5 kt breeze and waning ebb tide, all the fleets were sent on course #2, once around; start off the end of the Berkeley pier, up toward red rock, back almost to TI and back to finish. Fleet A completed the course in less than 30 minutes with skipper Kame Richards on Express 37 Golden Moon, keeping the lead over Express 37 Elan, skippered by Jack Peurach, by 27 seconds followed by Melgas 24 Smok'n, skippered by Kevin Clark in third place. The second race, #8 in the series, used the same placement of marks but went twice around as the wind had picked up to 10Kts and the tide had gone slack. Elan was leading at the down wind turning mark but Golden Moon slipped past her in the last yards to finish 8 seconds ahead of Elan, followed this time by the Mahoney's Tartan 101, Story Maker,

Fleet E, race more

In C Fleet J-22 Blue Jay with Skipper Theo Rohr after having to miss last months races took first place in both race 7& 8 followed in second place by Azure, Rodney Pimentel's Cal 40. Fleet D, Olson 25 one design fleet, was lead in both races by David Gruver in Sketch, followed by Steve Smith's Synchronicity and in third both races was Shadowfax with skipper Mark Simpson.


Race 8, with the wind filling to 10 knots plus

We are hoping you all are staying as healthy as possible during our 'Shelter in Place' period!





NOAA Plans to Discontinue Production of Traditional Paper Nautical Charts: The U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Office of Coast Survey announced plans to phase out the production of all traditional paper nautical charts. Over the next five years, NOAA says that it plans to transition to Electronic Navigational Chart (ENC) products with a focus on improving data consistency and providing larger scale ENC coverage. It is expected to significantly improve the level of detail and consistency in NOAA's ENCs. As it reorients its efforts toward electronic products, NOAA will gradually shut down services associated with traditional paper charts, including full-size chart PDFs, print-on-demand paper charts and NOAA raster charts (RNCs). The phase-out will start in mid to late-2020 and be completed by January 2025. NOAA will still provide access to paper chart products based on ENC data, either through third-party vendors or through the NOAA Custom Chart system (now in prototype phase). The online NOAA Custom lets users create their own paper charts with NOAA ENC data. The user can define the scale and size of custom-made nautical charts, then download them in a special PDF format.

The International Maritime Organization now requires that all large commercial vessels on international voyages use electronic charts. In 2016, the U.S. Coast Guard started allowing commercial vessels on domestic voyages to use ENCs instead of paper charts. Electronic products are also increasingly popular with recreational users. NOAA's Office of Coast Survey has produced traditional paper charts for nearly 200 years, and these products have been the primary source of navigational information for generations of American mariners. Comments on the decision may be submitted through NOAA's online feedback tool.
